We stand mystically present in those same streets, as God Himself mounts a colt that has never been ridden, and is surrounded by the praises of the entire world who has come out to meet Him. On that day, we sing in the streets and acknowledge that the Messiah is here! God's Son is amongst us! He has come...dearest Brothers and Sisters in Christ, and has made His triumphant entry into the world and into our lives.

"Now What?"

Holy Week....the week of our Lord's Passion is now upon us, and we are faced with some difficult decisions when it comes to how important our love and faith in our Lord's sacrifice is in our lives.

A Message from Fr. Gabriel

Will we meet His love for us with acceptance? Or Rejection?

Do we return His sacrifice with a sacrifice of our own, or do we turn our backs on Him?

When a recreational conflict arises that gets in the way of the extremely important worship services of Passion week...do we have the tendency to think: "my will be done..." or "Thy will be done"?

In the Gospel reading for Palm Sunday, we are presented with two figures who show the world where each of these paths ultimately lead. The first example is of Mary, the woman who anointed the feet of Jesus. Out of love for Christ, she took her most valuable possession in life, an alabaster jar of myrrh worth a fortune, and gave it up to God. This jar was mean to last someone for years...if not for a lifetime. It was probably passed down to her by her parents, and would have been her most precious



possession. But in an extravagant act of Love, she broke the jar open and recklessly anointed Jesus from head to toe.

That beautiful sacrifice that Mary made in the Gospel, is an example of someone who fully accepts the coming of God into their life. This is what it means to serve the Lord...Who is and always needs to be **our first and supreme love in this life!** When we have this mentality towards God, we come to the realization that Christ is our greatest possession! When we are able to separate ourselves from the things that tie us down in this world... when we make our Christian lives a priority over EVERY-THING ELSE...the result is **indescribable** joy.

The other path which we sometimes fall into is the same temptation that Judas succumbed to. On this joyous occasion, Judas could have gone to Mary and asked to help bathe Christ's feet in this myrrh. Instead, the devil was placed on his shoulder and caused him to **judge** the love that Mary had shown. He looked at her devotion to God, and for his own personal greed he asked: "Shouldn't this have been used for the poor?" . We of course learn that he said these things not because he loved the poor, but because Judas wanted to use a love offering to Jesus for himself.

We see this in our own fallen existence every day. Even with the knowledge and faith of what Christ did for us, we still fall into the trap of Judas, and spend our lives with priorities that are placed **above** the Love of God. Instead of waking up and thanking God for the breath He gave us to start another day, we rush downstairs to put the coffee pot on, and turn on the local news station to see what is going on that day.

Rather than go to Church on a day OTHER than Sunday morning, we so often spend Saturday Evenings out on the town. If we do come to Vespers, there is a temptation at times, to have our minds on what activities we have after services, instead of what is being chanted and prayed.

Rather than ending the day by shutting our eyes and saying "In your hands, I commit my spirit," our minds are else-

where, either on the glowing television set in front of us, or on preparing for what the next day holds.

Sometimes in our lives, we all have to admit that Christ is not the priority...and other things in life tend to take precedent over appreciating His love for us. We know from the example and ultimate fate of Judas, that when someone rejects the light and love of Christ, they find themselves in the darkness of a world that ultimately leads to an existence void of hope... and full of despair. This is why, dearest brothers and sisters in Christ, as we approach Holy Pascha, our priorities need to change right here...and right now. We cannot afford to treat this Holy Week and Pascha like we have treated all of the ones past.

The Greatest Week of our Christian Lives starts today! Our journey and submission towards Love starts now!

Let us now honor Him who came to show light to a darkened world. Let us praise Him who **healed** the sick, who **received** the love offering of Mary, and who **endured** the betrayal of Judas, all because He is the Lord of Love Who has come to save His people.

May we now journey with Him as He transforms death and allows all of those who seek a life of Christ to taste the fountain of immortality and everlasting life.

The Pascha Sermon



The Catechetical Sermon of St. John Chrysostom is read during Matins of Pascha.

If any man be devout and love God, let him enjoy this fair and radiant triumphal feast. If any man be a wise servant, let him rejoicing enter into the joy of his Lord. If any have labored long in fasting, let him now receive his recompense. If any have wrought from the first hour, let him today receive his just reward. If any have come at the third hour, let him with thankfulness keep the feast. If any have arrived at the sixth hour, let him have no misgivings; because he shall in no-

wise be deprived thereof. If any have delayed until the ninth hour, let him draw near, fearing nothing. If any have tarried even until the eleventh hour, let him, also, be not alarmed at his tardiness; for the Lord, who is jealous of his honor, will accept the last even as the first; he gives rest unto him who comes at the eleventh hour, even as unto him who has wrought from the first hour.

And he shows mercy upon the last, and cares for the first; and to the one he gives, and upon the other he bestows gifts. And he both accepts the deeds, and welcomes the intention, and honors the acts and praises the offering. Wherefore, enter you all into the joy of your Lord; and receive your reward, both the first, and likewise the second. You rich and poor together, hold high festival. You sober and you heedless, honor the day. Rejoice today, both you who have fasted and you who have disregarded the fast. The table is full-laden; feast ye all sumptuously. The calf is fatted; let no one go hungry away.


Enjoy ye all the feast of faith: Receive ye all the riches of loving-kindness. let no one bewail his poverty, for the universal kingdom has been revealed. Let no one weep for his iniquities, for pardon has shown forth from the grave. Let no one fear death, for the Savior's death has set us free. He that was held prisoner of it has annihilated it. By descending into Hell, He made Hell captive. He embittered it when it tasted of His flesh. And Isaiah, foretelling this,

did cry: Hell, said he, was embittered, when it encountered Thee in the lower regions. It was embittered, for it was abolished. It was embittered, for it was mocked. It was embittered, for it was slain. It was embittered, for it was overthrown. It was embittered, for it was overthrown. It was embittered, for it was fettered in chains. It took a body, and met God face to face. It took earth, and encountered Heaven. It took that which was seen, and fell upon the unseen.

For Christ, being risen from the dead, is become the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. To Him be glory and dominion unto ages of ages.

Healing Our Diseases: The Church as a Spiritural Hospital


We were blessed to have Very Reverend Father Josiah Trenham as our speaker for our annual Pan-Orthodox Lenten Retreat.
