

From Darkness to Light

From the Desk of Fr. Gabriel

Before we tell the story of what is happening in our Church this month, I want to take us all back 15 years ago. At 5:52 PM on August 24th, 2007, destruction struck our little town of Fenton, Michigan. A F2 tornado touched down in the heart of the downtown area taking down trees, destroying properties, business, and leaving several families homeless as their houses were turned into a pile of scrap. On our own little property, still 8 months from construction being completed on our little Church, there were fallen trees that littered the ground. Our Lord worked through my predecessor Fr. Paul Jannakos, along with several members of the parish, to take those fallen trees, mill them, and use the wood to create a beautiful Iconostasis that rises up before us when we come into the Church to pray.

When I first visited this parish, I remember thinking how awesome it will be to pray in front of all these wonderful Saints that would be looking down on me through the "windows" of this iconostasis! Learning the story of how our Lord worked through so many people to turn a natural disaster into such a wonderful instrument of Grace, just added to the "wow" factor!

The movement of evil to blessings is really the theme of this entire Holy Week isn't it? It begins with the Church reminding us of how God has used the evil of death to show us His power, to give us Hope, and to strengthen us for our own impending falling asleep. We hear in the Gospel about the great friend of Jesus, Lazarus, who had fallen ill in the town of Bethany. When things began to get desperate, Lazarus's sisters, Mary and Martha, sent word to our Lord, asking for Him to come and to heal their dear brother, but He delayed in coming. A few days later, we hear how the sisters were overcome with tremendous despair, because their brother was unable to overcome his illness and died. Their world, and maybe even a small part of their faith, crumbled around them.

Our Lord did eventually come to Bethany, and we know the rest of the story! After testing Mary and Martha's faith in the midst of their despair, our Lord raised Lazarus from the dead! In the 1st ode of the compline service for Lazarus Saturday, we hear: "You have made the tears of Martha and Mary to cease O Lord and Savior, by raising Lazarus from the dead. In Your Power, You have endued a corpse with the breath of life!"

Imagine the joy that the sisters of Lazarus felt after their dear brother who had been into the tomb for 4 days, had been brought back to them! Jesus had shown them, and all of the onlookers of Bethany that in the face of disaster, Glory always triumphs!

News of this miracle didn't just stay in the little village of Bethany. Word began to spread throughout the region that the Messiah had come! Jesus made His way to Jerusalem, and was greeted by large crowds, who threw their cloaks on the ground and shouted with loud shouts of joy, that same greeting that we shout today: "Hosanna! Blessed is He that comes in the name of the Lord!"

From Darkness to Light cont.

The Church urges us to shout for joy and to remember, that evil has no power when it encounters the Glory of God: "Let us shout aloud O daughter of Jerusalem, for behold Your King comes to you! Let us keep feast with the children, and holding branches in your hands, let us sing His praises: Hosanna in the highest, blessed is He that comes, the King of Israel!"

Starting Palm Sunday evening, we will see darkness overshadow the world once again. We witness the greatest evil that has entered the earth. The joy of the feast we celebrated is overshadowed by jealousy, hate, and unbelief, as the Son of Man is betrayed by His own creation and sent to His death. On Good Friday, creation itself moans and groans. Rocks split. The curtain of the temple is torn in two. The earth itself trembles in fear. But after three days of unimaginable sorrow felt by creation, we once again see the Glory of God Triumph over evil.

This is the theme of our lives dearest brothers and sisters in Christ, and it is why Holy Week is such an important week for us as Orthodox Christians. This one week truly does propel us to new heights and a new understanding of how God works in the world. This one week shows us what God like humility looks like. This one week shows us how we are to react to the evils, trials and difficulties that we face on a daily basis. But most importantly, this one week shows us what True Love looks like.





MONTHLY FORECAST

Reading of the Life of St. Mary of Egypt: On Thursday, April 7th, we will be reading the Life of St. Mary of Egypt in the Church, beginning at 6:30 PM. This reading will be live-streamed on our Facebook page, or it can be accessed on our YouTube page from prior years! Make it a priority during the first week of April to listen or read the life of this incredible Saint, who's repentance is an example to us all!

Pre-Sanctified and Potluck Schedule: We will be hosting the last Pan-Orthodox Presanctified Liturgy of the year at our parish on Wednesday, April 13th at 6:00 PM. Since we will have the other 3 churches joining us, we ask that everyone bring a Lenten dish to share for the potluck following the Liturgy! Remember to label your dish if it contains nuts.

Baptism and Chrismation Sunday: On St. Mary of Egypt Sunday April 10th, be sure to come a bit early to grab a seat, as we will be welcoming 8 new warriors for Christ via Baptism and/or Chrismation!

Lazarus Saturday: This year, we will be hosting the Lazarus Saturday Divine Liturgy on Saturday, April 16th, beginning with public proskomedia at 9:15 AM, followed by Divine Liturgy at 9:50 AM. There will be a pancake breakfast hosted by the SMMOY group following the Divine Liturgy. After breakfast, we will have Palm Sunday Great Vespers at an earlier time.

Palm Sunday and Parish Photo: Mark your calendars for Sunday, April 17th at 9:50 AM for Palm Sunday Divine Liturgy, followed by our annual parish photo. This will be the last photo we will take as a parish community prior to the expansion of our temple!

Holy Week Attendance: Just as we should be taking Clean Week as seriously as possible, so also do we need to devote all of our time and attention to the Holiest Week of the year. Holy Week begins on Friday, April 15th with Lazarus Saturday Vespers, and concludes at 11:30 PM on Saturday April 23rd for Pascha. Be sure to check the confession schedule to make sure we all enter this period with a renewed baptismal garment! Father Gabriel will not be hearing confessions after Great and Holy Tuesday as he prepares for Pascha.

Archbishop Alexander Visit & Protodeacon Michael Schlaack: We are excited to announce that Deacon Mike has been elevated to the role of protodeacon. Please keep him and the entire Schlaack family in your prayers. Archbishop Alexander will join us for Holy Unction on Great and Holy Wednesday (20th) and again on the morning of Great and Holy Thursday (21st) for the Divine Liturgy where he will formally elevate Deacon Mike. May God grant Deacon Mike many more blessed years in His Service.

Old Testament Readings for Children: There is a sign up sheet available in the Narthex for our children to read the Old Testament Readings on Great and Holy Saturday Morning! The children may borrow a book from the Church to practice their reading prior to that Saturday morning.

All Night Vigil: As is the custom at St. Mary Magdalene, the young adults and teens are invited to spend the night at the Church at the Grave Watch after Good Friday Services. Anyone wishing to take a shift at the tomb to read from the Scriptures is also welcome to sign up in the narthex. We will be live streaming the Tomb with no audio included for those who wish to read the psalms overnight at home.

Parish Office Hours: The parish office will be closed for regular business on Great and Holy Friday and Bright Monday.

Bright Week: Check the fliers for the service times and pan orthodox schedule for Bright Week! We will be hosting the Bright Monday Liturgy, April 25th, here at 10:00 AM!

Great Vespers Time Change: After Pascha, we will go back to our normal Great Vespers time of 5:00 PM until next Winter. Please mark your calendars accordingly!

Annual Children's Easter Egg Hunt: On St. Thomas Sunday (May 1st), the children are all invited to participate in our annual easter egg hunt on the parish grounds!

PASTORAL REFLECTIONS ON THE FOUR PILLARS OF CHURCH GROWTH

What is Happening in the Pillar of Worship?

We began Great Lent in March with Clean Week, which saw absolutely wonderful attendance for all of the services! My thanks to the Choir and all who prayed and sang from their seats, as we brought in the beginning of Great Lent with tremendous zeal! I pray that we can continue this process throughout all of Great Lent, not only with the regular services we have here at SMM, but with all of the Pan Orthodox Services as well.

We are scheduled to begin services after Bright Week in the building next door. We have received the blessing of the Archbishop to try and move the altar table next door here. There will be a lot of work towards the end of April that will be needed for the temporary Church transition, so please keep an eye and an ear out for opportunities to help!

What is Happening in the Pillar of Community?

At our special parish meeting, the congregation voted to move forward with the entire construction project, and to take out financing to make up the shortfall of what we do not come up with. We will be financing with OCCIF (Orthodox Church Capital Improvement Fund) which loans to Orthodox Churches that are in our position of growth. The interest on any funds that are taken out will be used to fund other Orthodox Churches doing the same thing we are.

Our community is also set to expand on Sunday April 10th, which is the week before Palm Sunday. We will be welcoming 8 new warriors for Christ via Baptism and/or Chrismation during the Divine Liturgy that week! We also would like to extend our prayers to Scott and Collin who were brought into the catechumenate in March!

What is Happening in the Pillar of Education?

In March, we welcomed Fr. Josiah Trenham for an online pre-lenten retreat on his Patron King Josiah and the topic of repentance. We also gathered together for a Pan Orthodox Retreat at St. Nicholas with Fr. Bogdan Bucur, who is the patristics professor at St. Vladimir's seminary.

This past week, many of our families might have received a call from Terri Oginsky, who was sharing some information about a development happening in cooperation with St. John Roman Catholic School in Fenton. I recently met with the principal about having a small Orthodox "wing" at their school, in which Orthodox students would be able to attend at a special parishioner rate, attend weekly Divine Liturgies (in lieu of Mass so that they can receive the Eucharist), and eventually incorporate an Eastern Christian curriculum at the school to enhance what the students are already learning from the Roman Catholic West. If anyone would like more information, please reach out to me!

What is Happening in the Pillar of Stewardship?

I hope everyone had a chance to distribute the Lazarus Bags that were put together by St. Photini in late February. I also wanted to thank all of those who helped to cook and support our appeal for the Ukrainian Relief Fund, of which we were able to send a check for \$3,000! We give Glory to God for all of your support!








ARCHBISHOP ALEXANDER IS VISITING!


PACK A BASKET!



As is our tradition at St. Mary Magdalene Parish we encourage everyone to bring a Pascha basket to be blessed and shared following the Paschal service on April 23rd-24th. This will be an opportunity to break bread (and meats) with your brothers and sisters in Christ on the Feast of Feasts as we celebrate our Lord's Resurrection together!

For those of you who are knew to the faith or unfamiliar with this tradition, the above illustration shows what a traditional basket may look like. However, as a multi-ethnic and multi-cultural parish this basket looks different to everyone! Some bring a very traditional basket while others may bring pizza or hot wings. Some bring a basket for their families, some bring crockpots to share. There is always more than enough to go around. The most important part of this tradition is the fellowship and celebrating the feast together! Please plan on staying following the Divine Services to continue the celebration, the church will remain open until the wee hours of the morning!

The Great and Holy Myrrh-bearer **Mary Magdalene**, equal to the apostles, and the patroness and protectress of our parish was a disciple of Jesus. She was Mary of Magdala, a town in Galilee. She was present at the crucifixion and burial of Christ. She was one of the first to see Him risen from the dead. (Matthew 27:55-61, Mark 16:1-10)





In her icon, St. Mary Magdalene is depicted holding a red egg telling the story of her attending the Emperor's banquet. She is holding a vessel, this tells the story of her as one of the Myrrh-bearing women. Lastly it shows her holding a cross which tells of her martyr death.









FELLOWSHIP AGAPE MEALS

Agape (Greek agapē): in the New Testament, the fatherly love of God for humans, as well as the human reciprocal love for God. In Scripture, the transcendent agape love is the highest form of love and is contrasted with eros, or erotic love, and philia, or brotherly love.

Sobornost: Divine-Human Oneness

Sobornost means spiritual harmony based on freedom and unity in love. It is a necessary component in our membership with the Body of Christ, for if we are not bound together in love, our freedom becomes our enemy, separating us from others and ultimately from Christ Himself. This concept was so important to early Christians that it was the basis for the agape meal, when Christians shared their food with one another after the celebration of the eucharistic banquet.

That the pre-communion fast would be broken after the Divine Liturgy with a communal meal (the love feast) clearly demonstrates the importance of community within the life of the Church. Sobornost is the divine human oneness we experience as members of the on Body, the Church, and is the moment when we who are many become one. It is the image of the unity of the Holy Trinity, finding its expression among the believers.

Sobornost is not the same as fraternity, a submission to a brotherhood for benefit of the individual. Rather, it is akin to *kenosis* (the relinquishment of divine attributes by Jesus Christ in becoming human) Sobornost is when the individual gives up self-benefit for the community or ecclesia.

We cannot truly be one in Christ if we do not seek out oneness with our fellow Christians. Nor can we be one with Christ if we routinely reject sobornost for heights of spirituality that make us so conscious of self that they separate us from our neighbor.












CAPITAL CAMPAIGN


