

The Lineage of the King of Kings

From the Desk of Fr. Gabriel

Our hearts today are filled with anticipation as we prepare ourselves to celebrate the Joy of the Nativity of our Savior! In December, we stand today at the threshold of the Winter Pascha, together awaiting the moment that changes EVERYTHING.

My dearest parish family, He is coming. The star is shining brightly above Bethlehem, and like the magi, we continue our journey towards the cave to fall down and worship this King of Kings, Who had been foretold to us throughout the centuries in the Old Testament.

Our Lord's family history was filled with many kings and nobleman. When we read through scripture, we cannot help but marvel at the power and wealth of some of these men that are apart of Jesus's Family. Solomon's throne for example, was made of ivory, and overlaid with gold. His cups, dishes, and even his royal bathtub were solid gold! The best made furniture, the strongest horses, the sweetest spices, the most beautiful brides...this is what was expected for the most powerful kings of the world!

But our Lord came, when this King of Kings made His entrance into mankind, He did so in a "not so king like way". Jesus wasn't born in a golden palace, surrounded by the riches of the Jewish Kingdom. His mother did not give birth in a featherbed made from the cedars of Lebanon. The Savior came into this world in the middle of a damp, cool, and rocky cave, being warmed by the breath of the animals that dwelt there. This seems completely backwards doesn't it? Why would the King of Kings, the Creator of Heaven and Earth, God Himself choose to be born in the midst of filth and darkness!?

If WHERE and HOW Christ was born wasn't bad enough, we are given this incredible Gospel text that we read every Sunday before Christmas, which gives us the listing of Jesus's family tree. Although some may regard it as a rather dull reading, the significance behind reading and understanding who these people are, is perhaps one of the most striking images in all of scripture! One would think that the family line of Christ would be full of virtuous leaders and kings (and indeed we do find many names on this list of people who led lives full of the Grace of God). More often than not however, when we look at some of the names on Jesus's family tree, what do we find? More filth than what was on the cave floor where He was born! We hear stories of idolatry, murder, anger, greed, and rape. Christ didn't come from a perfect lineage. He came from an extremely **imperfect** lineage, full of men and women who missed the mark, just like we do in our own relationship with God!

In the names we read today, there is one that I hoped to bring to the forefront, who wrote a beautiful prayer that we still use in one of our worship services today. Although it was King David who wrote perhaps Orthodoxy's most popular psalm 50 (51), there was another King later on in the list who also experienced and wrote beautifully about repentance, whose name was King Manasseh.

The Lineage of the King of Kings Cont.

Despite a positive upbringing by his father Hezekiah, Manasseh completely rejected a God Centered Life. When he was made king, he did everything he could to block out the Grace of our Lord. Rather than worshiping the One True God in the temple, he ordered that altars be built to Baal. Instead of asking God through prayer for help and advice on how to rule God's people, Manasseh spent his time consulting wizards and fortune tellers. Scripture even makes it a point to say that he put a lot of trust in the flight patterns and cries of birds to predict certain omens, rather than conversing with God.

Eventually, we know from experience that when we live a life absent of God, it catches up with us. King Manasseh was eventually captured and carried off into Babylon, and it was in the midst of the darkest time of his life, that he was finally humbled. Coupled with that humility came Manasseh's repentance and lament of the life with God that he had rejected.

As is the case with all who turn back to God through humility, our Lord's response to Manasseh was one of complete restoration. He was returned back to his kingdom in Jerusalem and lived out the rest of his days in peace and in communion with our Lord.

I bring up this story of this evil king who turned good, because I think it serves as a small picture of our own relationship with Christ. Although we might not create altars to Baal or consult with wizards and birds, we do not always put our complete trust in God. There are times in our lives where we too create idols out of money, politics, people, and possessions. We become anxious when our lives do not go as planned. We often lose sight of all that God has done for us. Yet despite all of these failings, when we finally wake up and decide to humble ourselves before the feet of our Lord, we become like Manasseh, and are restored to our former glory.

Why did Christ come to us in such a humble way? To teach us all, like He taught King Manasseh, how we need to approach the throne of God: With complete and perfect humility.

St. Ambrose of Milan wrote beautifully in the 4th century: "He was in a manager, so that we might be able to be at the altar. He was on earth, so that we might be in the stars. He had no place in the inn...so that we might have mansions in paradise."

What beautiful words from this early saint, that describes for us the life that we are all called to! This is our mark! This our destiny with the Christ Who comes into the world this week! But we learn today that it can only be achieved through extremely humility and sincere repentance.

When Manasseh was captured in Babylon, he wrote a beautiful prayer that we read during the Great Compline Service called "The Prayer of Manasseh". In this prayer, he humbled himself before God, and confessed all of the ways in which he had failed to live up to a Godly way of life. As we approach the Incarnation of Christ, let us echo Manasseh's words by saying:

"Lord, I am not worthy to behold and see the height of heaven, because of the multitude of mine iniquities. I am weighed down with many iron fetters, so that I cannot lift up my head by reason of my many sins... and now I bend the knees of my heart, asking for your Grace. I have sinned O Lord, and I acknowledge my iniquities... but I humble ask of Thee... For give me O Lord... for give me. For You are the God of those who repent, and in me You will manifest your goodness. For unworthy as I am, you will save me in your great mercy, and I will praise you henceforth, all the days of my life... Amen"






RECOMMENDED

Synaxis of the Most Holy Theotokos




Pastoral Report of Fr. Gabriel Bilas

"With the Worship of God, you live in Paradise. If you know and love Christ, you live in paradise. Christ is Paradise, and Paradise begins here...Our **chief concern**, is to devote ourselves to Christ, and unite ourselves to the Church." -St. Porphyrios

The building up of paradise on earth has been the mission of the Orthodox Christian Faith since the time of Christ. That same mission has survived tremendous persecutions, wars, famine, and even man-made pandemics. The same mission has survived through the collapse of empires, governments, and it will survive through the madness that has befallen the not only our own nation, but many other seemingly

developed western nations. There is a famous quote by St. Anthony the Great who warned of the days that we are now living in when he said: "A time is coming when men will go mad, and when they see someone who is not mad, they will attack him saying: "You are mad; you are not like us."

In a world that seems to be completely upside down, we give thanks to God for our connection to paradise and for our connection to the Church, which acts as a



sturdy rock of unchanging faith for us to balance ourselves as we are continually knocked down by the waves of life. The upkeep and growth of this "mission of paradise" and this love of Christ is and always will be our primary concern.

In reflecting on the past year, let me begin by remind everyone of the four pillars of the Church that are needed to keep the Mission of Paradise strong.

The Pillar of Worship

How can we begin to show our dedication to the mission of Paradise, without first making the commitment to experience it as often as we can? I am grateful that, despite the construction to our Church this year, we have increased the number of services that were offered from previous years! Here are some of the highlights of this pillar:

- On top of our regular Sunday Divine Liturgies, we maintained our weekday Liturgies with consistent attendance.
- As a "proud papa moment", the young adult group facilitated the addition of monthly Akathist services to the saints that are open to all.
- Towards the end of the year, we began a monthly ministry of praying an Akathist to the Theotokos for those suffering from cancer and other terminal diseases.
- · Saturday Vespers and Confession attendance has (by the Grace of God) increased.
- Most of our parishioners have taken their spiritual life seriously through frequent confessions and participation in the Sacraments.

For these reasons and more, I congratulate our parish community for growing in its life of worship and prayer, despite the difficulties of doing so without the type of Church Temple that we are accustomed to.

Thank you to our Choir, who continue their work and growth in the area of Liturgical Music. Thank you to our altar servers and to their parents for bringing their children here on time. Thank you to our readers. Thank you to those who help decorate and clean for the services. Thank you to all who have come and offered up at least one prayer in this Holy House, taking the steps necessary to "commend our ourselves, each other, and all of our life unto Christ our God."

The Pillar of Community

We first remember those members of our community who have and will continue to support the Church in the "Mansions of the Righteous": Elizabeth Ziats, Eleftheria Rissin, Taisa Czubenko, Cyrus Lazar, and Phillip Moorman. May their memory forever be eternal!

By the end of this calendar year, we will have welcomed 16 new people to the Holy Orthodox Faith through Baptism and Chrismation. We have 8 catechumens and several inquirers who are also taking classes towards entering into Holy Orthodoxy. As it stands today, we have an unofficial count of over 120 **regularly attending** Orthodox Adult Members, 11 Non-Orthodox Spouses, and just under 60 souls under the age of 18. These numbers do not include the various visitors and inquirers that we are now receiving on a regular basis at the Church.



Despite our space limitations, I remind everyone that a part of our mission is to provide a warm welcome to those who are seeking out Paradise. Thank you to our greeters who continue to be that warm first face that visitors see. Thank you also to those who have continued in their efforts to organize community events, meals, and coffee hours despite the space limitations!

The Pillar of Education

Despite the space limitations, I would like to thank our Church School staff, who has managed to maintain a very solid program for our children to engage in. Seeing the children not only learn about the faith, but also engage in their own little community together, has been a tremendous blessing to witness. The number of children in this parish never ceases to amaze me, and should be a wonderful assurance to us that as long as this pillar of education is strong, the Mission of Paradise will continue far into the future!

Metanoia for adults and new inquirers was revamped this year for those wishing to learn and grow in their faith. We also were blessed during Great Lent to welcome virtually Fr. Josiah Trenham who spoke to us about King Josiah and Repentance during Great Lent.

The Orthodox Book Club continued to meet on Thursdays, covering a variety of books such as "Our Thoughts Determine our Lives", "Wounded by Love", and "Everyday Saints".

God willing, after Church construction is complete, we will be able to return to a more complete and full offering of ways to grow in our knowledge of the faith.



The Pillar of Stewardship

Despite the difficult economy and rising inflation, I want to thank those who continued to honor their pledge and to those who tithed during this past year. To give of ourselves in time, talent, and treasurers shows a love of God, of each other, and of the Church. It also acts as an important spiritual discipline for all of us living in the world, to be able to put the Church and others first in all things.

While more on the financial stewardship of the parish will be offered in the treasurer's report, I also want to thank the entire St. Photini team who have coordinated our charity and community outreach efforts. Through their efforts, our parish has been able to maintain the "gentle presence of Christ" in the midst of the chaos of the world!

In Conclusion, I would like to thank each and every one of you for your spiritual labors this past year, no matter how big or how small they might have been. Most importantly, I want to thank my wife Matushka Laura and my four children, Lucy, Noah, Ileana, and Elijah, who have had to, and will continue to, sacrifice a lot for this unworthy priest to continue to do the work that he loves to do.

ST. TIKHON'S ORTHODOX THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Dear Family and Friends,

We hope you are all doing well! It seems like so much has happened since our last newsletter. It's difficult to believe that we have only been living here a little under four months!

Peter has been enjoying his classes and comes home every day with a sparkle in his eyes – it's clear that he loves what he's doing and that has a positive effect on our entire family. Besides his classes, there are a lot of other church obligations, but as we can join him for many of those, it seems like we get to see him quite often throughout the day. Our day-to-day life here feels very holistic with church at the center and community life, home life, and the occasional extracurricular well-integrated within it. The rural environment suits us perfectly. We don't want to be doing anything else.

I (Anna) have had the opportunity to teach some piano lessons again, which has been a lot of fun! I am hoping that more students will come, but in such a rural area as this, I am not sure how likely that is. We have a large sunroom-type area in the back of our house with a separate entrance that makes a perfect teaching space and music room. Because of the way the house is laid out, we can play music even when our kids are asleep, which feels like a huge blessing coming from the small apartment we had in Michigan. We will soon be acquiring a small electric organ from St. Patrick Western Rite Orthodox Church in VA that we have been storing with family since June. I am very excited to play organ again for the first time in about four years!

John has surprised me with a sudden interest in letters and numbers and "school" of a sort. We've been following a Montessori-type style of learning to read and we are both having so much fun. He is growing into a clever, talkative little guy who keeps us laughing constantly. He is turning three right after Thanksgiving. I can't believe how the time has flown on one hand, but on the other it seems that life has changed tremendously since he was born. We've done a lot of growing up together.

Theodore is suddenly not seeming so much like a baby anymore. He is able to communicate quite well, has a silly sense of humor, and, when he's not being sat upon by his big brother, is really developing physically, too. He mostly just tags along with whatever the rest of us are doing and seems quite content to be a giggly little caboose.

Last week we were blessed to have the entire Holy Synod here at St. Tikhon's! All 12 bishops of the OCA (Orthodox Church in America) were here, including Metropolitan Tikhon. The week's activities included our having dinner with the bishops of our diocese and spending time talking with them about our futures (mostly in general terms). The week culminated in a primatial Liturgy, including music composed and conducted by our own Benedict Sheehan, sung by the professional St. Tikhon Choir. FELLOWSHIP AGAPE MEALS

Agape (Greek agapē): in the New Testament, the fatherly love of God for humans, as well as the human reciprocal love for God. In Scripture, the transcendent agape love is the highest form of love and is contrasted with eros, or erotic love, and philia, or brotherly love.

Sobornost: Divine-Human Oneness

Sobornost means spiritual harmony based on freedom and unity in love. It is a necessary component in our membership with the Body of Christ, for if we are not bound together in love, our freedom becomes our enemy, separating us from others and ultimately from Christ Himself. This concept was so important to early Christians that it was the basis for the agape meal, when Christians shared their food with one another after the celebration of the eucharistic banquet.

That the pre-communion fast would be broken after the Divine Liturgy with a communal meal (the love feast) clearly demonstrates the importance of community within the life of the Church. Sobornost is the divine human oneness we experience as members of the on Body, the Church, and is the moment when we who are many become one. It is the image of the unity of the Holy Trinity, finding its expression among the believers.

Sobornost is not the same as fraternity, a submission to a brotherhood for benefit of the individual. Rather, it is akin to *kenosis* (the relinquishment of divine attributes by Jesus Christ in becoming human) Sobornost is when the individual gives up self-benefit for the community or ecclesia.

We cannot truly be one in Christ if we do not seek out oneness with our fellow Christians. Nor can we be one with Christ if we routinely reject sobornost for heights of spirituality that make us so conscious of self that they separate us from our neighbor.

ORTHODOX TRADITION OF HOLY SUPPER

CELEBRATED AT HOME BEFORE NATIVITY VIGIL



Following 40 days of the Advent Fast, the birth of Jesus Christ is commemorated with a final Lenten feast December 24th before the Nativity Vigil.

This tradition may look different village to village but the structure and the meanings stay the same. There are several symbolic features to the dinner table, including the placing of hay under the tablecloth in memory of the manger in which the Holy Child was placed by His Mother at His birth. Some grain is also thrown in the straw to represent the abundance of Christ's Coming. The linen tablecloth represents the birth clothes Christ was wrapped.

The Supper usually consists of 12 courses, symbolic of the 12 Apostles. In the Slavic custom the twelve fasting foods usually served are: barley, honey, stewed prunes, pierogi, sauerkraut, potatoes, lima beans, garlic, Lenten bread, mushroom soup and salt. Reminders that life is both bitter and sweet and that the work of each day throughout the current year was required to truly celebrate Christ's Coming. As a multi-cultural parish we will provide 12 different Lenten dishes that represent our diverse parishioners.

THE HOLY SUPPER

The meal begins with the singing of the Christmas troparion and the lighting of a candle placed in the center of the table. The candle symbolizes the star of Bethlehem.

The Holy Supper usually takes place in the home with the father leading the family in the prayer ritual. It begins with the youngest child reading the Nativity account from the Gospel of St. Matthew 2:1-12.

The father then starts with an opening prayer asking God to bless the bread, wine, and food. He then breaks the bread and passes it out to all present. This symbolizes Christ at the Last Supper.

The supper begins with a spoonful of the traditional Kutya, a cooked wheat or barley kasha, sweetened with honey, poppy seeds and chopped nuts – symbolic of joy and happiness.

An extra empty place is always set at the table for Jesus, either in Spirit, or in the form of a traveler or stranger invited into the home, for none are turned away on this day without a warm invitation to partake of this Holy Supper.

Then the prayers are said by the father. If there is a priest present the prayers are lead by him instead of the father.

The Prayers & Ceremony

FATHER: O Lord Jesus Christ our God, Who blessed the five loaves in the wilderness and with them You satisfied the five thousand, bless this loaf, wine, and the food we are about to eat and multiply them in this city, and in all the world, and sanctify all the faithful who partake of them. For it is You, O Christ our God, Who bless and sanctify all things, and to You we ascribe glory, together with Your Father, Who is without beginning, and Your all-holy, and good, and life-creating Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages.

FAMILY: Amen. *Honey is placed on the forehead with the words:* "May we love one another as the bee loves honey. The cup of wine in passed around for each to drink."

"Unite us in Faith and Love. Bread is broken and passed to all. It is then dipped into the honey and eaten:"

" Let us love one another. Garlic is eaten – not pealed but cracked with the teeth."

" May God Spare us from all Evil."

The twelve Lenten foods are eaten without knives or pepper. Pepper symbolizes arguments and knives the cutting of friendship.

FATHER: May He who was born in a cavern and lay in a manger for our salvation Christ our true God, through the prayers of the Holy Theotokos, of the Holy Apostle and Evangelist Luke and of all the saints have mercy on and save us for He is good and loves mankind.

FAMILY: Amen

After Supper, the candle is blown out gently and if the smoke rises straight up it means a blessing for the year. It is traditional for all to attend a Vigil Service following which the choir may begin visiting homes to sing Christmas Carols.

Traditional Foods Served

The foods range from bitter to sweet to remind us of the bitterness of life before Christ was born and the sweetness of life which comes after His birth.

The number 12 symbolizes the twelve apostles.

Two may be chosen from each category – except soup. Appetizers: Ikra (caviar), Kutya, Pick-led Mushrooms, Piroshki (with mushroom or sauerkraut filling), Herring (with beet and onion slices), Baklazhan (eggplant caviar).

Soup: Mushroom, Barley, Fish (with dumplings), Borscht, Cabbage, Vegetable.

Fish dishes: Baked Pike, Trout or other, Fried Filet of Sole or Bluefish, Fish in Aspic, Stuffed Carp, Fishcakes, Fried Smelts, Boiled Lobster.

Vegetable dishes: Potato Pancakes, Boiled Potato (with dill), Baked Sauer-kraut, Baked Sliced Beets, Potato Salad (with beets), Cauliflower (with bread crumbs and margarine topping), Lenten Cabbage Rolls, Pickled Baked Cabbage, "Malosolniyeh" Pickles (freshly dilled).

Fruit & cake: Dried-fruit Compote, Cherry or Blueberry Vareniki, Poppy seed Cake or Roll. Nut Pudding, Apple Strudel, Kissel, Fruit Rolls.

Beverages: Wine, Kvass, Tea (served with preserves and lemon slices)
