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Preparing for the "March" that is to come!

A message from Fr. Gabriel

In this month of February, we celebrate the Presentation of our Lord into the Temple (February 2nd). For the last 40 days, we have been celebrating the events of the Winter Pascha, remembering and watching in awe as the Creator of the Universe humbled Himself to become a small and helpless child, born in a cave, becoming man so that we could become gods! Now this month, we celebrate his Churching...the day when the Most-Pure Virgin brought the Christ Child to the temple for the first time which was the custom of the law.

The offering of a child to the temple was a very serious matter in the Old Testament, and in the life of Israel. If we remember back from the book of Exodus, after our Lord had brought the 10 plagues upon Egypt, He said that from that day forward, there would be a firstborn rite for His people. Every first-born child of every family, from the day of their birth, now belonged to God.

As was the Jewish Custom, in order to "get the child back", the family had to bring them into the temple and offer a sacrifice of either a lamb (for those that could afford it), or two turtle doves. This is why in the icon, you see Joseph bringing two turtle doves the temple!

40 days after Christ's birth, the Theotokos brought Him to the temple. He was welcomed by the High Priest Zachariah, who we know from history was the Father of St. John the Baptist. Zacharia took the Child and then did something that was unthinkable at the time! The high priest invited Mary to go to the place in the temple that was set apart for the virgins!

This of course infuriated the Pharisees, who were the "temple lawyers" of the day. How can Zacharias allow this woman, who clearly just had a son, and is here with her betrothed...sit in the

place of the Virgins! They were no doubt furious as to what they were seeing!

As Mary took her place in the temple, a righteous elder named Simeon, who we are told was a very "devout and just man...one who obeyed all of the commandments", wanted to hold the Christ child in his arms. He had been told by the Holy Spirit decades before, that he would not pass from this life until he had seen with his own eyes the Savior of the world. Taking the child in his arms, Simeon offered us that beautiful prayer that we still sing at least once a week here at the Church at Great Vespers:

"Lord, now let Your Servant depart in peace...according to Your Word. For my eyes have seen Your Salvation, which you have prepared before all peoples. A light to enlighten the Gentiles, and the Glory of your People Israel."

Holy Tradition tells us that the Pharisees were furious about what they were seeing! How long are we going to let this charade continue...and allow this man to speak blasphemies about this young child! They quickly stormed off to tell Herod the horrible things that they had seen, but by the time Herod had summoned his men to investigate, the family had already left the temple.

Before giving Jesus back to Mary, perhaps after seeing the Pharisees become enraged and storm out of the Temple, Simeon said

something else that is striking to hear, **especially** in our day and age: "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rising of many in Israel..." To put it a different way, those who approach this child with humble hearts, obedience, and clarity of vision will be raised up in the Glory of Christ. However, those who are like the Pharisees... those who are full of pride and resist the truth...will eventually fall.

Later on in the month of February, we begin our Pre-Lenten Sunday March towards the Great Fast. These next few weeks are vital for us as Christians who desire to be on the right side of that prophecy of Simeon! Early on next month, we will be embarking on a new 40-day journey of self-emptying, purification, and sacrifice.

Anyone who has experienced Lent to its fullness knows that it is an absolutely wonderful marathon for the spiritual life, but like any marathon, it requires training and preparation from us as Christians. If we do not prepare, if we don't stretch ourselves for the beginning of the marathon, what happens when the gate finally opens? We cramp up and fall flat on our faces!

Use this time as a period of examination! Slowly changing those habits that have been built up throughout the year! Do we spend more time on our phones or on the internet, than we do in prayer? Do we get angry with the politics of the day? Are we able to control our stomachs...saying "no" to more food than what is needed? Have we caught ourselves from swearing...or have stayed away from situa-

tions that would cause us to? Have we kept the openings of our soul (our eyes, our ears, our mouth) away from situations or negative entertainment that could affect us? When we pick up our bibles, do we have to blow on them to get the dust off? Have we picked up and read at least one chapter of the New Testament, outside of Church this year? Have we invoked our Lord's name in prayer at least once a day? Have we had at least one prostration before our Lord in a prayer at home? (You will do them all the time coming up shortly...get those abs ready!). Have we judged anyone more harshly than we do ourselves? Have we shown love to everyone who comes into our path? If there are priorities that are completely out of alignment, use this time of preparation to begin correcting them.

When the dust finally settles after blowing off our bibles and our prayer rules, if we have all done our spiritual cleanse faithfully, we will find ourselves on the right end of Simeon's prophecy, and be able to rise up with our Lord, on that glorious day of His Resurrection!

Month in Review

We had quite a busy month of January, with our river blessing, lamb roast to go parish dinner, and our annual service for the unborn all happening on consecutive Sundays. January also saw the completion of the renovation of our parish office and education center, which will be blessed when the Archbishop joins us in Mid-February. Glory to God for all things!

Recommended Reading

The Living Witness of the Holy Mountain: Contemporary Voices from Mount Athos

By: Archbishop Alexander Golitzin

From as early as the ninth century, Mount Athos — a monastic republic situated on a peninsula in northern Greece extending some 35 miles into the Aegean Sea — has been a monastic center and a spiritual beacon of the Orthodox world. As the present collection of essays, sermons, narratives, and apophthegmata shows, the significance of the work of the monks who come to Athos to devote themselves to God continues undiminished, as does the vitality of their contribution to the spiritual life of Orthodoxy worldwide. In these pages we see the simplicity and truth of the Gospel reflected in anecdotes of contemporary Fathers of the Holy Mountain; we read of the connection between the light of Christ's Transfiguration on Mount Tabor and Orthodox monastic spirituality; we learn how St. Herman of Alaska, America's first Orthodox saint, was a kind of gift to America from Athos. Several writings by Archimandrite Aemilianos (Vapheides), Abbot of Simonos Petras Monastery on Mount Athos, set forth the critical importance of the spiritual father and the Jesus prayer in an Orthodox monastery, and the link between monasticism and martyrdom. A leading French Catholic scholar recounts in detail his path to Orthodoxy over a span of many years. Also included is the Tomos of Mount Athos in Defense of the Holy Hesychasts — an important Orthodox doctrinal document, written in the fourteenth century by St. Gregory Palamas and signed by the elders of the Holy Mountain. These writings, together with the others in this volume, have all been written by Athonite monks. All but one of them appears in English for the first time, translated by His Eminence, Archbishop Alexander (Golitzin), who contributes, in his illuminating Introduction, an examination of Athonite history, organization, and daily life.





The Meeting of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in the Temple

On February 2nd the Church commemorates an important event in the earthly life of our Lord Jesus Christ (Luke 2:22-40). Forty days after His birth the God-Infant was taken to the Jerusalem Temple, the center of the nation's religious life. According to the Law of Moses (Lev. 12:2-8), a woman who gave birth to a male child was forbidden to enter the Temple of God for forty days. At the end of this time the mother came to the Temple with the child, to offer a young lamb or pigeon to the Lord as a purification sacrifice. The Most Holy Virgin, the Mother of God, had no need of purification, since she had given birth to the Source of purity and sanctity without defilement. However, she humbly fulfilled the requirements of the Law.

At this time the righteous Elder Simeon (February 3) was living in Jerusalem. It had been revealed to him that he would not die until he should behold the promised Messiah. By inspiration from above, Saint Simeon went to the Temple at the very moment when the Most Holy Theotokos and Saint Joseph had brought the Infant Jesus to fulfill the Law.

The God-Receiver Simeon took the divine Child in his arms, and giving thanks to God, he spoke the words repeated by the Church each evening at Vespers: "Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, according to Thy word, for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation, which Thou hast prepared before the face of all people, a light to enlighten the Gentiles, and the glory of Thy people Israel" (Luke 2:29-32). Saint Simeon said to the Most Holy Virgin: "Behold, this child is set for the fall and rising again of many in Israel, and for a sign which shall be spoken against. Yea, a sword shall pierce through your own soul also, that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed" (Luke 2:34-35).



Pre-Lent

The paschal season of the Church is preceded by the season of Great Lent, which is itself preceded by its own liturgical preparation. The first sign of the approach of Great Lent comes five Sundays before its beginning. On this Sunday the Gospel reading is about Zacchaeus the tax-collector. It tells how Christ brought salvation to the sinful man and how his life was greatly changed simply because he "sought to see who Jesus was" (Lk 19.3). The desire and effort to see Jesus begins the entire movement through lent towards Easter. It is the first movement of salvation.

The following Sunday is that of the Publican and the Pharisee. The focus here is on the two men who went to the Temple to pray—one a pharisee who was a very decent and righteous man of religion, the other a publican who was a truly sinful tax-collector who was cheating the people. The first, although genuinely righteous, boasted before God and was condemned, according to Christ. The second, although genuinely sinful, begged for mercy, received it, and was justified by God (Lk 18.9). The meditation here is that we have neither the religious piety of the pharisee nor the repentance of the publican by which alone we can be saved. We are called to see ourselves as we really are in the light of Christ's teaching, and to beg for mercy.

The next Sunday in the preparation for Great Lent is the Sunday of the Prodigal Son. Hearing the parable of Christ about God's loving forgiveness, we are called to "come to ourselves" as did the prodigal son, to see ourselves as being "in a far country" far from the Father's house, and to make the movement of return to God. We are given every assurance by the Master that the Father will receive us with joy and gladness. We must only "arise and go," confessing our selfinflicted and sinful separation from that "home" where we truly belong (Lk 15.11–24).

The next Sunday is called Meatfare Sunday since it is officially the last day before Easter for eating meat. It commemorates Christ's parable of the Last Judgment (Mt 25.31–46). We are reminded this day that it is not enough for us to see Jesus, to see ourselves as we are, and to come home to God as his prodigal sons. We must also be his sons by following Christ, his only-begotten divine Son, and by seeing Christ in every man and by serving Christ through them. Our salvation and final judgment will depend upon our deeds, not merely on our intentions or even on the mercies of God devoid of our own personal cooperation and obedience.

... for I was hungry and you gave Me food, I was thirsty and you gave Me drink, I was a stranger and you took Me in, I was naked and you clothed Me, I was sick and in prison and you visited Me. For truly I say to you, if you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to Me (Mt 25).

We are saved not merely by prayer and fasting, not by "religious exercises" alone. We are saved by serving Christ through his people, the goal toward which all piety and prayer is ultimately directed.

Finally, on the eve of Great Lent, the day called Cheesefare Sunday and Forgiveness Sunday, we sing of Adam's exile from paradise. We identify ourselves with Adam, lamenting our loss of the beauty, dignity and delight of our original creation, mourning our corruption in sin. We also hear on this day the Lord's teaching about fasting and forgiveness, and we enter the season of the fast forgiving one another so that God will forgive us.

If you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will forgive you; but if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your heavenly Father forgive you your trespasses (Mt 6.14–18).

February Church School Announcements

Archbishop Alexander will be visiting us on February 13th and 14th. Here is what you should know ...

A Bishop is a member of clergy who has received the highest of the sacred orders and represents Christ in the church. A bishop is consecrated by at least three other bishops and is successor of the Apostles. Our church belongs to the bishop and Father Gabriel serves in the bishop's place when he cannot be here. The bishop will serve Vespers and Divine Liturgy with us.

How to great a bishop:

- We don't shake a bishop's hand, give him a hug or a high five. Instead we kiss his right hand and ask for a blessing. We do this because we seek to honor Christ. Afterall, the bishop represents Christ in the church.
- Cup your hands in front of you, with your right hand over your left and your palms facing up.
- Bow your head and say "Master, Bless" The bishop will then give you a blessing in the sign of the cross and put his hand in your hands.
- Gently lean forward and kiss the bishop's hand.







St. Mary Magdalene Lenten Psalm Group

Preparing for Pascha by Praying the Psalms



The Goal:

To draw nearer to Christ and one another during the Lenten Fast, by praying the Psalms together as a community, as we journey together towards Holy Pascha.

How it Works:

The Orthodox Church divided the book of Psalms into 20 sections (called a Kathisma). In our St. Mary Magdalene prayer group, we will each be assigned a different section each day, throughout the 40 days of the fast. By the end of Lent, our parish will have read through the entire book of Psalms twice. If everyone is keeping up with their individual sections every day, it also means that our parish community together is praying the entire book of psalms daily!

Added Bonus:






