Transformative Grace

A message from Fr. Gabriel

During these winter months, especially if you are an "early riser", one of most beautiful things you can do in the morning is to go out in to the crisp and clean air, and stare up at the clarity of the night sky...waiting for the coming of the dawn. Over the course of just a few minutes, you can watch as the planets and the stars disappear from view when the Sun comes over the horizon, shining its brilliant rays on the world. In the midst of this beauty, one cannot help but think to the beginning of the Great Doxology in the Matins service, when the priest exclaims: "Glory to Thee Who has shown us the Light!

However magnificent the sunrise is, it pales in comparison to the beauty and light that comes upon the Human Race on the Feast of Holy Theophany! On January 6th, Christ descends into the waters of the Jordan, and the heavens literally open, with a voice coming down from the sky, saying something that will change the world forever: "This is my beloved Son, of Whom I am well pleased".

This simple statement made from the Father, is a very blazing and public revelation of Truth and Power. God is now dwelling with us, in the midst of His creation! He isn't just some omnipotent being in the heavens, Who plays with His creation like pawns on a chessboard! He is here, dwelling among us, and continually revealing His power and His Love through the Worship, Mysteries, and Sacraments of His Holy Church!

For those who are new to the Orthodox Faith, it is on the Feast of Holy Theophany that we bless and sanctify water, remembering how Christ sanctified the waters of the Jordan. There is a very pious custom that is popular in many Orthodox Countries, where after the waters are blessed, men and women will dive into icy waters...plunging themselves into the depths of the various frozen lakes and rivers three times. They do this to be reminded of their own baptisms, when the Holy Spirit came into ordinary water, and put to death mankind's old ways of wickedness, and allowed them to awaken as adopted sons and daughters of God.

There are many in the outside world that would look upon this custom as odd, just like they do at so many of the other mysteries (sacraments) of the Church. From an outside perspective, these mysteries of the Church seem like a bunch of hocus pocus, useless rituals that have no purpose, and no way of changing mankind and the world. But it has been the teaching of Christianity from the very beginning, that it is through the sacraments that the human race is truly transformed.

There is a beautiful (and historical) story that explains this much better than I could, which took place in the first centuries of the Church, during the reign of Emperor Julian the Apostate in the 4th century. He was celebrating his birthday and had asked for comedians and actors to come in and entertain the guests at the grand banquet that was throw in his honor. One of the popular things to do at that time, was to poke fun and make fun of the Christians who were under persecution at that time by the state. The pagan actors came up with an elaborate scene, in which they would mock the various beliefs of Christians, including their belief in the power of baptism.

All of the actors came on stage, some dressed as priests, another dressed as a bishop, and a man, whose name was Porphyrios, played the role of the man who was going to be baptized. They brought out a large font of water and a white baptismal robe as props. After the scene started, every one of the actors, included Porphyrios, tried to out-do the other with derisive posturing, ridiculing gestures, and an over dramatization of the prayers that were supposed to be said over the waters. Towards the end of the performance, Porphyrios went into the font, and the actor dressed as the Bishop shouted: "The Servant of God Porphyrios is baptized in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit!" He then thrust Porphyrios down into the waters, and it was there that something unexplainable happened. In the Synaxarion (Lives of the Saints), we read:

"As Porphyrios came up from the waters, he was donned in the white robe, and suddenly felt himself transfixed. A complete serenity overcame him, and out of a bright light that only he could see before him, came a voice which said that he was truly being baptized in the name of the trinity."

After this incredible transformation, Porphyrios refused to continue with the rest of the act. In an act of pure courage and defiance towards the Emperor, he started to denounce all that were present, for mocking the true God of the Christians! He was so changed by the waters of Baptism, and he held on to this new reality so tightly, that not even the threat of death from the king could cause him to turn his back on our Lord! The last sentence in the story of his life, sums up everything very nicely: "By the will of God, he was transformed from a clown of the king, to a servant of the Lord".

Transformative Grace...this is what we are given through all of the sacred mysteries of the Church, and it is what we are reminded of on this great Feast of Theophany. Why does the priest encourage the entire flock to attend the Church services, to take participate in the sacraments, to go to confession, to be present for blessings, and to receive the Body and Blood of Christ as often as possible? Because it is in these mysteries that God's power is revealed to the human race! The mysteries (sacraments) of the Church are the only things that exist in this world, that can truly change and transform us as sons and daughters of the creator of all.

As we begin this new year, celebrating and remember the manifestation of God's power through His Holy Epiphany, let us once again make a commitment to allow ourselves to be transformed by His power through prayer, silence, and the sacred mysteries which He has entrusted to those who seek eternal life with Him.

Feast of the Theophany of our Lord & Savior Jesus Christ

Theophany is the Feast which reveals the Most Holy Trinity to the world through the Baptism of the Lord (Mt.3:13-17; Mark 1:9-11; Luke 3:21-22). God the Father spoke from Heav-

en about the Son, the Son was baptized by Saint John the Forerunner, and the Holy Spirit descended upon the Son in the form of a dove. From ancient times this Feast was called the Day of Illumination and the Feast of Lights, since God is Light and has appeared to illumine "those who sat in darkness," and "in the region of the shadow of death" (Mt.4:16), and to save the fallen race of mankind by grace.

In the ancient Church it was the custom to baptize catechumens at the Vespers of Theophany, so that Baptism also is revealed as the spiritual illumination of mankind.

The origin of the Feast of Theophany goes back to Apostolic times, and it is mentioned in The Apostolic Constitutions (Book V:13). From the second century we have the testimony of Saint Clement of Alexandria concerning the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, and the night vigil before this Feast.

There is a third century dialogue about the services for Theophany between the holy martyr Hippolytus and Saint Gregory the Wonderworker. In the following centuries, from the fourth to ninth century, all the great Fathers of the Church: Gregory the Theologian, John Chrysostom, Ambrose of Milan, John of Damascus, commented on the Feast of Theophany.

The monks Joseph the Studite, Theophanes and Byzantios composed much liturgical music for this Feast, which is sung at Orthodox services even today. Saint John of Damascus said that the Lord was baptized, not because He Himself had need for cleansing, but "to bury human sin by water," to fulfill the Law, to reveal the mystery of the Holy Trinity, and finally, to sanctify "the nature of water" and to offer us the form and example of Baptism.

On the Feast of the Baptism of Christ, the Holy Church proclaims our faith in the most sublime mystery, incomprehensible to human intellect, of one God in three Persons. It teaches us to confess and glorify the Holy Trinity, one in Essence and Undivided. It exposes and overthrows the errors of ancient teachings which attempted to explain the Creator of the world by reason, and in human terms.

The Church shows the necessity of Baptism for believers in Christ, and it inspires us with a sense of deep gratitude for the illumination and purification of our sinful nature. The Church teaches that our salvation and cleansing from sin is possible only by the power of the grace of the Holy Spirit, therefore it is necessary to preserve worthily these gifts of the grace of holy Baptism, keeping clean this priceless garb, for "As many as have been baptized into Christ, have put on Christ" (Gal 3:27).

Born! Glorify Him!




Recommended Reading from Fr. Gabriel

St. Mary Magdalene 2020 Lenten Monastery Pilgrimage

Trip Itinerary

Sunday, March 29th: Divine Liturgy at St. Mary Magdalene in Fenton Michigan. Depart for Holy Trinity Jordanville Monastery, arriving on Sunday Evening. *We will be traveling through Canada, so **Passports are required!**

Monday, March 30th: Morning Services at the Monastery and Breakfast. Tour of the Cathedral, Baptistery, Candle Factor, Incense workshop, and bookstore. Lunch and free time to explore, before departing for St. Tikhon's Monastery in the evening

Tuesday, March 31st: Early Morning Services at the monastery, followed by breakfast and a tour of the Monastery Church, Museum, and Grounds. Lunch, followed by free time in the afternoon. Depending on availability, a visit to see the weeping icon of "The Tender Heart" in Taylor, PA, followed by dinner at Cooper's restaurant in Scranton.

Wednesday, April 1st: Pre-Sanctified Divine Liturgy at the Monastery Church and a bookstore visitation. Departing early afternoon for Holy Transfiguration Monastery in Ellwood City, PA.

Thursday, April 2nd: Morning Services and breakfast with the Mothers and Sisters, followed by a tour of the Monastery Grounds and Bookstore. Lunch will be provided, before departing home for St. Mary Magdalene

Cost is \$340 per person

(Cost does NOT include fuel, restaurants, and donations to the monasteries)



ARCHPASTORAL MESSAGE OF HIS BEATITUDE METROPOLITAN TIKHON NATIVITY OF OUR LORD 2019

To the Honorable Clergy, Venerable Monastics, and Pious Faithful of the Orthodox Church in America,

My Beloved Brethren and Blessed Children in the Lord,

Christ is born! Glorify Him!

As we celebrate the Birth of Jesus Christ in the flesh, and His baptism in the River Jordan, we call to mind the important roles that his mother, the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary, and his Forerunner, John the Baptist, had in bringing about these events that manifested Christ to the world. For the Theotokos and the Baptist are indeed excellent examples for us, as we share their same calling to make Christ present in the world.

When Mary received the glad tidings that she was to become the Birth-giver of God, she humbly responded: "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be to me according to thy word." She then visited her relative Elizabeth, who was six months pregnant, and when she greeted Elizabeth, the babe in Elizabeth's womb leaped for joy. This babe, as we well know, was Saint John the Baptist, the Forerunner of Christ.

The importance of John the Baptist in the Gospels cannot be overemphasized. As the Forerunner of Christ, he not only proclaimed that Jesus of Nazareth was the Christ, but also died a martyr's death for speaking the truth, foreshadowing that Christ, the Truth, would die for the Salvation of the world. In dying for the truth, John is not only the Forerunner to Christ, but also the Forerunner to all those who have died for Christ throughout the centuries, the countless martyrs who have struggled and been slain for Christ for more than two thousand years. Some Christians are still called to this level of witness, to this level of dying in martyrdom for the sake of Christ. The twentieth century saw more Christian martyrs than any century beforehand, in places such as Russia, Romania, and Turkey. The twenty-first in turn is seeing many Christian martyrs in places like Ethiopia, Nigeria, and Syria. We pray for strength and steadfastness for all Christians suffering persecution for the sake of Christ, and in turn we ask for the intercessions of those who have died martyr's deaths in witness of Christ.

Yet certainly, not all Christians are called to be slain for Christ, to be beheaded like John the Baptist or many of the later martyrs. Neither are all called to be like the Baptist as public preachers or wandering ascetics. For those who do not have the Baptist's calling, another route is provided: the calling to live like the Virgin Mary. For while John made Christ known to the world, it was through the Virgin Mary that Christ came to be born in the flesh. She is the Theotokos, the bearer of the Lord Jesus Christ, and in the same way, Christians can "bear Christ" and make Him present. Instead of preaching God's works across hills and dales, we can keep them close and ponder them in our hearts (see Luke 2:19). By thus meditating on God's works, we will become authentically humble, gentle, and kind like Mary. And in this process of contemplating what Christ has done for us, we will gain boldness before Him in our

private conversations with Him. Forging a personal relationship with Christ, we will have boldness to ask Him and His servants for what is needed, just as Mary His Mother did at the wedding in Cana.

These two great figures, John the Baptist and Mary the Theotokos, thus help us grapple with a perennial problem of Christians: how do we keep the winter feasts of the Nativity and Theophany meaningful throughout the year? The Church's calendar points us to the solution: the day after the Nativity of the Lord, December 26, is dedicated to the Lord's Mother, and January 7, the day after the Theophany of the Lord, is dedicated to the Lord's Forerunner. Hence the Church tells us that imitation of the Forerunner and the Theotokos are the keys to making Christ's winter feasts more than just a few days of celebration. The Baptist shows us the way of outward witness, of forceful and defiant objection to the falsehood propagated in the world, while the Theotokos shows us the way of inner stillness, of contemplation of the mystery of Christ. And Christians can imitate the lifestyle of either one, because ultimately both John and the Theotokos are doing the same thing: both are witnesses to Christ, and steadfastly remain eternal witnesses to His death and resurrection.

So, give glory to Christ on the feasts of His Nativity and Theophany, while honoring and magnifying in song the Theotokos and Mother of the Light, and praising the Baptist as is his due. For they reveal to us the different ways in which Christians can witness to Christ, and are our primary examples of how to live a Christian life, not only at this festal season of Nativity and Theophany, but throughout the entire year.

Christ is born! Glorify Him!

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NATIVITY OF OUR LORD 2019

"On this all-peaceful night let us neither be menacing nor boisterous...
On this night of the Humble One, let us be neither proud nor haughty...
On this day of rejoicing let us not share sorrows...
On this calm day let us not be quick-tempered...

Today the Deity imprinted itself on humanity, so that humanity might also be shaped into the seal of Deity."

The above excerpt from the Hymns on the Nativity by St. Ephraim the Syrian celebrate the profound meaning of the birth of our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ. Every year as Christmas approaches, we hear the lament that the corporate world has turned the feast into a commercial caricature of its original celebration. This is true, without a doubt.

However, let us also take care not to fill the celebration of our Lord's birth with empty platitudes, forgotten the day we throw out the Christmas tree. The gathering of family and friends, the exchange of gifts, the table fully laden with Christmas dinner—these are but outward expressions of an inner truth.

The birth of Christ grants us the possibility of partaking in his Sonship, becoming full inheritors of God's glory, "shaped into the seal of Deity." Christ has come to offer us an end to the isolation caused by our sin. He is born to grant us resurrection and eternal life, the greatest of all gifts for which we are so undeserving. He comes to invite us to partake in his eternal banquet, the "wedding supper of the Lamb." (Revelation 19:9)

The only-begotten Son and Word of God "appeared on earth and lived among men, and, becoming incarnate of a holy virgin, he emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being conformed to the body of our lowliness that he might make us conformed to the image of his glory." (Anaphora of St. Basil) Even if we have none of the usual fare of "Christmas cheer" in our life, this truth resonates forever like that song of the angels heard by the shepherds. This, as they say, is "the true meaning of Christmas."

May the Incarnate Son of God, our Lord Jesus Christ, fill our hearts with light and life during this festal season, throughout the New Year, and unto the ages of ages.
