A message from Fr. Gabriel


We spent 40 days in tremendous anticipation of the coming of the Savior to the world, and now stand at the brink of a second feast of **joy and revelation**, as we celebrate this month the Feast of Holy Theophany or the "unveiling", when Christ descended into the waters of the Jordan and the world saw the heavens open up with a voice coming down from the sky proclaiming: *"This is my beloved Son of Whom I am well pleased!"*

The joy of these two feasts (Nativity and Theophany) comes from one striking truth, that is read multiple times in the services of Christmas and of Theophany: "God is with us." He stands in the midst of His Creation. He isn't just some omnipotent being in the heavens who plays with His creation like pawns on a chessboard. He is here when we are experiencing the greatest joys in our life. His arm is around us when we are shrouded in the darkness of despair. When we spend a majority of our days with our backs turned from Him and towards the world...God is With Us. Those four words, that wonderful reality, is what unites the Feasts of Nativity and Theophany together. It is why we can all agree with Andy Williams when he sings in that beautiful baritone: *"It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year."*

In light of the Feasts that we are celebrating, I want to offer a resolution that we as Orthodox Christians simply cannot break this year. There is a habit that needs to be formed within us NOW, while it is fresh. One change that we can make in our lives that is guaranteed to give us the strength that is necessary to draw closer to God: *Take the Joy of Christmas and Theophany with you throughout the rest of the year*.


That child-like joy and innocence that we experience during the Feast of Christmas...that special feeling that somehow makes Christmas Day stand out from all of the rest...take it all, bottle it up like Holy Water, and sprinkle it throughout the next 365 days. All of that joy, all of those smiles, and the glorious reality that is the coming of Christ cannot cease in our hearts once the Christmas Tree has been taken down.

There are times this year where life will become rather difficult. The world is recovering from a massive pandemic. The effects of being bottled up in 2020 will add stress to our lives that will make us want to pull our hair out. There are some families who have been recovering from the loss of a family member who has gone on to eternal life. But through all of those challenges, and throughout all of the challenges that await us in 2021, we have to remember and lean on those words that we sang during Compline: "God is with us!" He is here! He is present in the Church! He is present in our lives! His Holiness is found within each and every one of us!

There is a question that often comes up every year from Non-Orthodox Christians around this feast of Theophany, when they ask: "Why do you bless water? What was wrong with it before?" The answer is always the same: We bless things to make them Holy. We bless water to set it apart for use by God and His Church. That once ordinary water is then used to bless the inside of our Church, and to be "sprinkled" on each and every one of us for that same purpose: To make us all holy, to strengthen us, and to set us apart to live a life with God.

So today, and every day this year, I urge you all to embrace that holiness! Don't just let the joy of this feast pass away after you get back into your cars following Theophany Liturgy! Take the Holy Water that we will bless this month with you and into your homes. Sprinkle yourselves with it every day, reminding you of your own baptisms...that day when you were consecrated and set apart for a life of holiness and life of joy with our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

God is With Us and We are with Him! May that be the reality that is celebrated not just during the 12 days of Christmas, but throughout every day and every moment of our lives.







Feast of the Theophany of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ

Commemorated on January 6 from oca.org

Theophany is the Feast which reveals the Most Holy Trinity to the world through the Baptism of the Lord (Mt.3:13-17; Mark 1:9-11; Luke 3:21-22). God the Father spoke from Heaven about the Son, the Son was baptized by Saint John the Forerunner, and the Holy Spirit descended upon the Son in the form of a dove. From ancient times this Feast was called the Day of Illumination and the Feast of Lights, since God is Light and has appeared to illumine "those who sat in darkness," and "in the region of the shadow of death" (Mt.4:16), and to save the fallen race of mankind by grace.

In the ancient Church it was the custom to baptize catechumens at the Vespers of Theophany, so that Baptism also is revealed as the spiritual illumination of mankind.

The origin of the Feast of Theophany goes back to Apostolic times, and it is mentioned in The Apostolic Constitutions (Book V:13). From the second century we have the testimony of Saint Clement of Alexandria concerning the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, and the night vigil before this Feast.

There is a third century dialogue about the services for Theophany between the holy martyr Hippolytus and Saint Gregory the Wonderworker. In the following centuries, from the fourth to ninth century, all the great Fathers of the Church: Gregory the Theologian, John Chrysostom, Ambrose of Milan, John of Damascus, commented on the Feast of Theophany.

The monks Joseph the Studite, Theophanes and Byzantios composed much liturgical music for this Feast, which

When You, O Lord were baptized in the Jordan / the worship of the Trinity was made manifest / for the voice of the Father bore witness to You / and called You His beloved Son. / And the Spirit, in the form of a dove, / confirmed the truthfulness of His word. / O Christ, our God, You have revealed Yourself / and have enlightened the world, glory to You!

is sung at Orthodox services even today. Saint John of Damascus said that the Lord was baptized, not because He Himself had need for cleansing, but "to bury human sin by water," to fulfill the Law, to reveal the mystery of the Holy Trinity, and finally, to sanctify "the nature of water" and to offer us the form and example of Baptism.

On the Feast of the Baptism of Christ, the Holy Church proclaims our faith in the most sublime mystery, incomprehensible to human intellect, of one God in three Persons. It teaches us to confess and glorify the Holy Trinity, one in Essence and Undivided. It exposes and overthrows the errors of ancient teachings which attempted to explain the Creator of the world by reason, and in human terms.

The Church shows the necessity of Baptism for believers in Christ, and it inspires us with a sense of deep gratitude for the illumination and purification of our sinful nature. The Church teaches that our salvation and cleansing from sin is possible only by the power of the grace of the Holy Spirit, therefore it is necessary to preserve worthily these gifts of the grace of holy Baptism, keeping clean this priceless garb, for "As many as have been baptized into Christ, have put on Christ" (Gal 3:27).





Nativity Message from Metropolitan Tikhon

Nativity of our Lord 2020

To the Venerable Hierarchs, Esteemed Clergy, Reverend Monastics, and Beloved Faithful of the Orthodox Church in America,

My Beloved Brethren and Blessed Children in the Lord, on this the glorious and light-filled Feast of the Nativity in the Flesh of our Lord, God, and Savior Jesus Christ, I greet you with the words that resound throughout our Churches and homes during this season: Christ is Born! Glorify Him!

By the grace of God, we have come through an extraordinary year fraught with challenges and trials that none of us could have expected. We have found ourselves confused, scared, and anxious. As we realized the frailty of our earthly life and the many fleeting things of this world to which we so often cling, more than anything, we have found ourselves in need of a Savior.

It is especially in these challenging moments that we are strengthened by God's promise, spoken in the book of Deuteronomy, "Be strong and of good courage, do not fear or be in dread of them: for it is the Lord your God who goes with you; he will not fail you or forsake you (Dt 31:6)." As children of God, as children of the promise, we should remain steadfast in hope. We should never let our hope waiver, because, as the present feast reminds us, we are strengthened continually by the presence of Emmanuel, our Lord Jesus, who saves us from our sins and weaknesses, and reconciles us with our heavenly Father. The scripture, hymns, and rites of the feast testify that Jesus Christ, born of the Virgin Mary, is He who has also died on the Cross, and become the first-born of the dead, raised us all by the Power of God, and opened the gates of the kingdom to us.

The great Prophet Isaiah, speaking of this kingdom, tells us:

Of the increase of His government and peace there will be no end, upon the throne of David and over His kingdom, to order it and establish it with judgment and justice from that time forward, even forever (Is 9:7).

Beloved hierarchs, clergy, monastics, and faithful, let your hope be renewed at the Nativity of Christ! Be assured that God is with us! Perceiving the mystery of this feast, difficulties and trials in this life will become bearable, as your faith is strengthened, and your hope remains firm.

Nativity Message from Archbishop Alexander

NATIVITY OF OUR LORD 2020 Our memories of holiday celebrations past, surrounded by loving family and friends, help set the stage for our present-day festivities. Perhaps this year, under the continued limitations placed upon us by the Coronavirus, chief among them the social isolation of many, we are in a more nostalgic mood than usual. This longing for Christmas celebrations of days-gone-by is not unexpected. Let us be mindful, however, that we must not regard the Lord's Nativity as merely the commemoration of a past event.

The birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ is an event that both happens in time and also transcends time. Our festal greeting is, "Christ is born," not, "Christ was born." The "Lord, I call" verses for the Vespers of the Nativity begin with the words: "Come, let us greatly rejoice in the Lord as we tell of this present mystery!"

The singular act of God directly intervening in human history through the incarnation of his only-begotten Son reaches beyond first-century Bethlehem, spreading joy and good will into the past, to our Holy Forefathers of the Old Testament, and to future generations of believers until the Lord's return.

Through our services, our carols, and our acts of love towards others, we very truly become witnesses of Christ's birth, along with the shepherds and the Magi. With this in mind, our celebrations become for us, not just nostalgia, but a means by which the Christ-child is born in the manger of our hearts today.
