A message from Fr. Gabriel

This month, we begin our incredible journey through Great Lent...and I can tell you that I am probably more excited for this year's journey more than I have ever been. After feeling like we were missing out a bit last year, every one of us is in need of the prescription of Lent that the Church gives us to weed out our selfish wants and desires...and to once again focus on our relationship with God.

The beginning of Great Lent starts off where it will eventually end...at the foot of the Cross which we will bring out to the center of the Church on Forgiveness Sunday. The entire congregation will have the chance to venerate the feet of our Lord, while gazing in wonder at the incredible love that God has for mankind.

Beginning that Sunday of March 14th (*mark your calendars before you read the next sentence*) we will all take the place of Adam and Eve...walking in the Garden of Eden...weeping at what we as Human Beings have become, because we have put ourselves, our own wants, and our own desires above God. We have been inundated with "Philativa" (an excessive love of ourselves) while putting God and our neighbors second. We have seen throughout our entire lives what happens to the world when humanity does this. In the Matins service for the Saturday before Lent, we hear the incredible sadness of the first human being Adam, who after casting himself out of paradise, cried out:


"Woe is me, for the serpent has deprived me of my boldness before God, and through eating from the tree, I have become an exile from the joy of paradise!" Woe is me! No more can I endure the shame! I was once king of all God's creatures upon the earth, and have now become a prisoner, led astray by evil council. I who was once clothed in the glory of immortality, must now as one condemned to die, wrap myself miserably in the skins of mortality. Woe is me! Who will share my sorrow with me? O Lord who loves mankind, Who has fashioned me from the earth and art clothed with compassion...call me back from the bondage of the enemy, and save me."

What is Great Lent, brothers and sisters? It is our calling **back** from the enslavement of our passions, our wants, and our desires. It is about purging ALL of those things that lead us to forget **WHO** WE ARE...**WHAT** WE WERE MEANT TO DO...AND **WHERE** WE ARE CALLED TO BE.

March 14th...The church invites us to begin our journey back, all of the while repeating those words that we hear Adam say in Great Vespers the night before: "O Lord...call me back to Eden."

I ask for your forgiveness for any way that I might have offended you...whether voluntary or involuntary...whether in knowledge or in ignorance...and I ask that you pray not only for me, but for the rest of your brothers and sisters, as we journey together towards Golgotha and the Holy Pascha.



ORTHODOX BOOT CAMP: THE HARDEST WEEK OF THE YEAR

Every year around this time, I like to reminisce about my time at St. Tikhon's Seminary, which was attached to the oldest Orthodox Monastery in our relatively young country. It was during the first week of lent, often called "Clean Week", where we would exchange all of our academic classes and mental work for the much more difficult and demanding work of purifying the heart.

Services would begin hours before the sun would rise and go for several hours in the dark. We would take a short break for an hour or so, and then head back to the Church for another few hours of services, before departing for the afternoon for some quiet reflection. Then, early in the evening, we would return for the Compline service and to hear the famous canon of St. Andrew of Crete, before going to bed and restarting the whole process over the next day.

As any seminarian can attest, you start out on clean week with a rush of adrenaline. Lent is here! The hymns have that familiar somber tone, and your heart knows that Pascha is on it's way! Many of us would even wake up a half hour early and go into the Church before the marathon of services even began, just to quiet our hearts! Then, after about Tuesday, the adrenaline wore off, and we were just happy to make it to Church on time. By Thursday, some of the seminarians would arrive around 5:45 AM instead of the 5:30 AM start time...perhaps pushing snooze one too many times. On Friday, after spending an exhausting week at the Monastery Church, we were nourished and enriched with the Eucharist at the first Presanctified Liturgy...and left with an incredible feeling of Grace and Preparation for the march towards golgatha that was to come.

Clean week in the Orthodox Church is incredible, beautiful, sombor, enlightening, exhausting, and tiring all at the same time. On top of the services that are sharpening our hearts, we begin our strict fasting that first week, which also causes our bodies to feel a bit weaker as they adjust to the new period. Despite all of this, truthfully, there is no better way to start off a spiritual journey than by participating in Clean Week as fully as we possibly can.

Our little Church in the woods is not a monastery, and we do not do nearly the amount of services that you would see at a monastery...but we do offer a very rich and full week of spiritual pruning through the services that are held every day. Beginning on Monday, we have a beautiful Matins service in the morning beginning at 9:00 AM...the perfect start to the week. That evening, and every evening for the rest of the week, we participate in the Compline Service with the Penitential Canon of St. Andrew of Crete. On Friday, we get that same nourishment from the Holy Gifts that the seminarians and monastics so desperately need after a long week of purification. Participating in Orthodox Clean Week is hard...it is difficult...but it is also absolutely necessary in the life of an Orthodox Christian. I cannot wait to experience it with the rest of you!

Month in Review

We had a wonderful month of February that was highlighted by a visit from His Eminence Archbishop Alexander! The offices and classrooms were blessed as we officially closed the book on our much needed repair and remodel project of the education center! Glory to God for all things!

Recommended Reading

"Father George Calciu; Interviews, Homilies and Talks"

Father George Calciu (1925-2006) was one of the great confessors of Christianity in the twentieth century. Having survived the diabolic prison experiments of Communist Romania, Fr. George went on to become an apostle to spiritual seekers in Romania and, eventually, throughout the world. He was able to speak authoritatively of God's love and forgiveness because of his own experience of God's mercy. As a priest in America, Fr. George maintained a strict ascetic life of fasting and prayer, while at the same time pastoring his flock as a joyful and loving father. Here we present a collection of his interviews, homilies, and talks. In them he shares his thoughts on his imprisonment, how to pray, his own experience of God's Uncreated Light, and the Orthodox Christian's battle against temptations in America. Included in this volume are the Seven Homilies to the Youth that he gave in Bucharest in 1978. These homilies, in which he fearlessly called Romanian youth to turn from atheism and materialism to Christ, led to his second imprisonment by the Communist regime. Here, as in his other writings and talks, the common thread of God's mercy and forgiveness is woven into the fabric of man's need for repentance and union with his Creator.







Pre-Lenten Pan Orthodox Retreat and Vespers:

On Saturday, March 6th, we will be joining with our Pan Orthodox Churches at 2:00 PM for our annual retreat. This year's speaker is Fr. Maximos Constas, who will be speaking about an Orthodox Approach to Sickness and Suffering. This is a FREE RETREAT! Take advantage!

St. Photini Meeting:

Our lay-led parish community outreach organization called the Fellowship of St. Photini. They organize charitable events, collections, and service projects so that we as a parish can truly follow the directives laid out by our Lord in Matthew 25, in helping our neighbor. The fellowship will be meeting for current and new members on Sunday, March 7th, following the Divine Liturgy. The meeting will also be offered virtually. No Thursday Divine Liturgies during Lent:

Remember that during Great Lent, there will be no Thursday Divine Liturgies offered. The last weekday Divine Liturgy will be on Thursday, March 11th, and will pick up after Great and Holy Pascha.

Socially Distanced Forgiveness Sunday:

Great Lent starts on Sunday, March 14th with Forgiveness Sunday. We will be implementing a safe and socially distanced way of asking forgiveness of one another, so please make sure you attend this important beginning to Great Lent.

Orthodox Clean Week:

The first week of Great Lent is called Clean Week, and offers us the opportunity to examine our souls for the various illness of the passions that assail us. For many, the first week can be demanding and tiring...as it serves as a bit of an Orthodox Boot Camp for the soul. If you have never done a full Orthodox Clean week...make this the year that you commit to going to all of the services, no matter how exhausted or tired you might be. The benefits that come from this physical and spiritual workout are such that they can propel you towards the rest of Great Lent. Clear your calendars, and make the commitment this year!

Orthodoxy Sunday Procession:

Do not forget to bring your favorite icons to be blessed on Orthodoxy Sunday, as we will be doing an outdoor procession with our icons after the Divine Liturgy, bringing the holiness of Orthodox Worship outside of the four walls of the Church!

Lenten Psalm Group:

This year, we will be having our second annual parish lenten psalm group readings. Each day, we will be assigned a particular section of the psalter to read in our private prayers at home. We will also be on a separate email group, where we can pray for each other each day during Great Lent. Memorial Saturday:

On Saturday, March 27th, we will be remembering all of our parish family departed with a memorial service starting at 3:30 PM. Great Feast of Annunciation:


The Pan Orthodox Celebration of Annunciation will be held at Holy Assumption Greek Church on Thursday, March 25th, beginning at 10:00 AM.

St. Mary Magdalene Lenten Psalm Group

Preparing for Pascha by Praying the Psalms



The Goal:

To draw nearer to Christ and one another during the Lenten Fast, by praying the Psalms together as a community, as we journey together towards Holy Pascha.

How it Works:

The Orthodox Church divided the book of Psalms into 20 sections (called a Kathisma). In our St. Mary Magdalene prayer group, we will each be assigned a different section each day, throughout the 40 days of the fast. By the end of Lent, our parish will have read through the entire book of Psalms twice. If everyone is keeping up with their individual sections every day, it also means that our parish community together is praying the entire book of psalms daily!

Added Bonus:

As we go through the journey together, there may be a specific prayer request that you might ask the group to assist you in, whether it is for someone who is sick, suffering, or maybe someone who recently departed. Feel free to email the group email, asking for specific prayer requests to be sent out.

What do I Need?

All you need is a bible, an email address, and some time each day to pray!




Holy Confession:

In confession, the sacrament of repentance, we come to Christ and receive His divine forgiveness. We are allowed once more to enter into Holy Communion with Him in the Church. We are reinstated into that life which we received in baptism and are renewed with that power which we were given in chrismation.

Throughout Great Lent there will be confessions available on Saturday's following Vigils and every other Wednesday following Compline.


