The Definition of Holiness

From the Desk of Fr. Gabriel

As lovers of Holy Scripture, specifically of the Old Testament stories surrounding the Ark of the Covenant and the Jewish Temple, our entire perception of what the Ark is, where the true temple is, and what true holiness looks like, is magnified this month as we celebrate the Entrance of the Theotokos on Sunday, November 21st!

For those that need a small refresher of the Feast, we remember how Mary's parents Joachim and Anna were unable to bear children. They made a promise to God that if they were granted a child, they would dedicate him or her to a complete life of service to God. A short time later, Mary was born. After living out her first few years being guided by her parents, the day had finally come for Joachim and Anna to fulfill their vow to God. They brought the three-year-old girl to the temple, where she was to live out the remainder of her childhood in service to the Lord.

Mary was greeted by the High Priest Zacharias, who led her into the nave of the temple, but it was there that something unthinkable happened! Instead of going where she was supposed to go, Mary was led by the Holy Spirit to begin climbing the steps that led to a sacred place that absolutely no one, not even the priest except for one day a year, was permitted to enter! She entered into The Holy of Holies, where the Ark of the Covenant was kept before it was lost!

No one dared go back into the Holy of Holies! We see stories in the Old Testament of what happened to people who tried to defy God's law in regard to holy things and holy places! One of my favorite stories is one that we read in 3rd Maccabees, just a few hundred years before Christ. King Ptolemy, after he had made peace with the Jews, wanted to visit the temple of their God. When he walked into the sacred space, like most people when they walk into an Orthodox Church for the first time, he was astonished by its beauty. But, in King Ptolemy's arrogance, he wanted to go see the Holy of Holies...that one place that was forbidden in the entire temple. The Jewish Priests begged him not to go, telling him that not even their own people were permitted to go in there! But King Ptolemy ignored the cries of the priests and continued to walk towards the Holy Place. As soon as he entered the sacred space, the King experienced intense seizures, and began to shake so much that he could not even muster the strength to call out for help. His servants eventually had to drag him out of the temple, which sets up the rest of the book. (Spoiler alert, it involves God delivering His people from drunken elephants in the arena!)

This story about King Ptolemy isn't unique. Throughout all of the Old Testament, we hear a slew of examples of what happens when people unworthily come into the presence of God. Yet, on this Feast Day, we hear how the High Priest silently watches as the Holy Spirit leads this little girl into the Holy of Holies, eventually taking the place of the Ark of the Covenant as the New Ark that would soon bear the Word of God within herself!

What made Mary unique? What made her stand out from all the men in history who had disregarded the Power of God in their lives?

The Definition of Holiness Continued

Holiness...She was unblemished by sin and lived a life of complete holiness.

Mary living a holy life didn't happen by accident. All of this was made possible by the two wonderful models that she had in her parents Joachim and Anna, who taught their daughter **by their own example** of what it meant to live a life of holiness. This is perhaps the most important lesson that we can pass on to our children, and even if you do not have children, we are reminded (especially in our little Church) that it takes a village to raise this new generation. It isn't done by books, lectures, or finger pointing, it is done by example. We show our children how to become holy by putting GOD FIRST in all things.

Our children learn from us by watching what we do, not what we say. If we devour our food before offering things to God, the fact that the food came from Him is lost, and we teach our children that thanksgiving is meaningless. If we put other things in life before Church, either staying in bed on Sunday Morning, or attending a concert or a sporting event (anything where we put the Church second) we teach our children that our faith isn't important. We teach and pass on **holiness** not by the words that come out of our mouth, but by the way that we live our life.

We might ask, why is this important? Because every time we come to a Divine Liturgy, all of us, (our children included) approach the Holy Altar in what is our own personal "entrance into the temple" feast day. All of us approach God Himself in the chalice, and in a very real sense, approach the Holy of Holies itself. Do we exude holiness like the Theotokos did when she drew near to God? When we are making those steps towards the altar, can we truly say that we draw near without stain or blemish? Or do we echo the words of St. John Chrysostom by saying:

"O Lord my God, I know...oh how I know...that I am not worthy or sufficient that you should ender under my roof, into the habitation of my soul...for it is deserted and in ruins, and you have no fitting place in me to lay your head."

Holiness, Purity, and an "awe" of God...these are the key words that make up the importance of the Entrance of the Theotokos Feast Day. As we begin our journey towards the Cave in Bethlehem, let us practice these virtues so that our Lord can descend down from heaven above, and find a worthy place to lay His head within our Hearts, while lifting us all up into His Presence!



Also, a big thanks goes out to all who helped to make the FARR Soup Sale an incredible success! We were able to donate \$2,000 to help families in need for our local communities!




RECOMMENDED READING

THE NATIVITY FAST – WHY WE FAST

November 15, marks the beginning of the Nativity Fast (40 days before Christmas). The following article offers some thoughts on the purpose of fasting.

Fasting is not very alive and well in the Christian world. Much of that world has long lost any living connection with the historical memory of Christian fasting. Without the guidance of Tradition, many modern Christians either do not fast, or constantly seek to re-invent the practice, sometimes with unintended consequences.

There are other segments of Christendom who have tiny remnants of the traditional Christian fast, but in the face of a modern world have reduced the tradition to relatively trivial acts of self-denial.

I read recently (though I cannot remember where) that the rejection of Hesychasm was the source of all heresy. In less technical terms we can say that knowing God in truth, participating in His life, union with Him through humility, prayer, love of enemy and repentance before all and for everything, is the purpose of the Christian life. Hesychasm (Greek Hesychia=Silence) is the name applied to the Orthodox tradition of ceaseless prayer and inner stillness.

But these are incorrectly understood if they are separated from knowledge of God and participation in His life, union with Him through humility, prayer, love of enemy and repentance before all and for everything.

And it is the same path of inner knowledge of God (with all its components) that is the proper context of fasting. If we fast but do not forgive our enemies – our fasting is of no use. If we fast and do not find it drawing us into humility – our fasting is of no use. If our fasting does not make us yet more keenly aware of the fact that we are sinful before all and responsible to all then it is of no benefit. If our fasting does not unite us with the life of God – which is meek and lowly – then it is again of no benefit.

Fasting is not dieting. Fasting is not about keeping a Christian version of kosher. Fasting is about hunger and humility (which is increased as we allow ourselves to become weak). Fasting is about allowing our heart to break.

I have seen greater good accomplished in souls through their failure in the fasting season than in the souls of those who "fasted well." Publicans enter the kingdom of God before Pharisees pretty much every time.

Why do we fast? Perhaps the more germane question is "why do we eat?" Christ quoted Scripture to the evil one and said, "Man does not live by bread alone but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God." We eat as though our life depended on it and it does not. We fast because our life depends on the word of God.


The Nativity Fast – Why We Fast continued

I worked for a couple of years as a hospice chaplain. During that time, daily sitting at the side of the beds of dying patients – I learned a little about how we die. It is a medical fact that many people become "anorexic" before death – that is – they cease to want food. Many times family and even doctors become concerned and force food on a patient who will not survive. Interestingly, it was found that patients who became anorexic had less pain than those who, having become anorexic, were forced to take food. (None of this is about the psychological anorexia that afflicts many of our youth. That is a tragedy)

It is as though at death our bodies have a wisdom we have lacked for most of our lives. It knows that what it needs is not food – but something deeper. The soul seeks and hungers for the living God. The body and its pain become a distraction. And thus in God's mercy the distraction is reduced.

Christianity as a religion – as a theoretical system of explanations regarding heaven and hell, reward and punishment, is simply Christianity that has been distorted from its true form. Either we know the living God or we have nothing. Either we eat His flesh and drink His blood or we have no life in us. The rejection of Hesychasm is the source of all heresy.

Why do we fast? We fast so that we may live like a dying man – and in dying we can be born to eternal life.


O who loves Nicholas the saintly, O who serves Nicholas the saintly, Him will Nicholas receive, And give help in time of need: Holy Father Nicholas!*
